On farm Okatumba - West, near Seeis (40km east of Windhoek Airport)

The Nharo are a Bushmen language group, which today are living in the wider area around Gobabis. Their language is closely related to the Ju/'Hoansi a bit further north, by Tsumkwe. No Nharo lives as hunter – gatherers anymore. A group of them got a chance to build their own Living Museum on the farm Okatumba – West.

They run this business by themselves and show visitors their old historic, traditional culture including the use of various bush food, tracking, snaring and other hunting methods, making crafts, singing, healing dances and much more.



A well trained English speaking San guide will accompany you through all activities. The dress worn is accurately reconstructed according to historic accounts and all activities shown are purely original of their old culture. No modern compromises will be displayed!



To reach the Living Museum of the Nharo San coming from the Windhoek International Airport drive east, passing Seeis. After Seeis you turn onto the second gravel road to the left (north) onto the D 1535. Seven kms from this turn-off you find a big signboard leading you another 7 km into the farm and directly to the reception of the Living Museum.

The Living Museum is open every day throughout the year from just after sunrise until sunset. You don't need to book in advance, as the Nharo will be there at all time during daylight.

If you like to camp out there you will find a few beautiful tree–shaded camp sites on the shore of the White Nossob river. Water, rustic toilets and bush showers are available. Please book your camp site in advance as space is limited. If available you may buy organic meat and vegetables from the farm shop.

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Programmes: 2010 / 2011

- 1. Bush walk** with hunting, snaring, tracking and collecting bush food.
+- 1,5h; N\$ 100.- / person
- 2. Singing, dancing and games** around the camp fire. Feel free to join in the fun.
+- 1,5h; N\$ 100.- / person
- 3. Crafts in the village:** lighting a fire, making ropes and snares, jewellery, bow and arrow and prepare and taste traditional bush food. Learn and join in.
+- 2h; N\$ 120.- / person
- 4. Action Day:** It includes everything as in programme 3 as well as the bush walk, singing, dancing, playing games, shoot a bow, throw a spear and watch the traditional doctor healing a patient. We also teach you to make your own bow and arrow as well as ostrich egg pearls and your own jewellery the old way.
+- 4 – 8 h; N\$ 200.- / person
- 5. Tracking Game:** Following game tracks like Oryx, Kudu, Hartebeest, Warthog or what we might find together with one or two hunters. Please take along about 5 litre of water.
